
"Vital Delivery Operations" Customer Engagements in Kosrae, Chuuk, Yap

Every year, we supply over 21 million gallons of fuel to Customers in five locations: Chuuk, Kosrae, Pohnpei, Nauru and Yap. As the largest fuel

supplier for the FSM and Nauru, it is a critical requirement that every member of our Operations Team is well qualified, trained and certified in their respective roles. During the last quarter of 2019, we extended to our Contract Customers for gasoline and diesel an invitation to a one-day training, to refresh their supervisors and managers on the various elements and processes within Vital that make each delivery possi-

ble. With over 20 years of work experience in the fuel industry, fifteen of them in operations and terminal management, Key Accounts Manager Trevayne Esiel facilitated the training with the know how of a seasoned tanker truck driver. After completing the training for Customers in Pohnpei in July, he facilitated the same training for Our Customers in Kosrae Kosrae Port Authority; Kosrae Department of Transportation & Infrastructure; HT&Sons; Senny's Gas Station; MT Fuel Station; Fuel Land; Hardy Andrew Gas Station; Yap - Yap ARFF; YSPSC; Last Stop; YCA; T&T Service Station; and Chuuk - Micro Enterprises, Inc.; Island Mart; and BS Corporation. The training covered the entire Delivery Procedure (right: sample slides), covering the various forms required to the step by step process from the time of payment to delivery; the anatomy of a tanker truck; key equipment like the loading gantry, seals and






personal protective equipment (PPE); as well as the Vital team behind every delivery. Customers were then invited to voice concerns and raise issues and questions, and discuss with fellow service station owners. Trevayne concluded the training by thanking all participants: "On behalf of the Corporation, I'd like to thank each and every one of you, Our Customers, for taking time from your busy schedules to discuss something you are already very familiar with--deliveries--and allowing me to share on the other side of the delivery process that you may be less familiar with. This is also a valuable engagement for Vital, as we are able to collect feedback from you on areas for improvement."



Yap Terminal completes Fire Extinguisher Training with Yap ARFF, State Fire Dept



In September, our Yap Terminal staff participated in and successfully completed a one-day "Basic Fire Extinguisher Training." The training was a collaborative exercise with Yap International Airport Aircraft Rescue and Firefighting (ARFF), and Yap State Division of Public Safety-Fire/Rescue. Participants were certified by Mr. Collin Heise, Chief - Yap State Fire Department and Mr. Dominic Brug, Chief - Yap ARFF.

Yap Terminal Officer-in-Charge John Rumwol commented, "This training served as a refresher course for many of my team, and as new knowledge and skills development for my newer staff. It's very important that each and every one of them know the different types of fire extinguishers, and when and how to properly use them. They are now CAN DO to put out smaller fires while first responders are on the way." OIC Rumwol emphasized the importance of the training as both teambuilding and capacity building with these first responders: "Yap International Airport ARFF and the Yap State Fire Department play a critical role in our fire safety processes, and Vital highly values their invaluable expertise and assistance."

Pohnpei Tank 1 Commissioning

Due to the climbing sales trend for Jet A1 fuel in Pohnpei, a Team was formed to manage a complex Project for the regrading of Tank 1 from diesel (ADO) to Jet A1.

Jet A1 is a type of aviation fuel that is used primarily in aircraft powered by gas-turbine engines, and has stringent storage, handling and delivery standards and processes defined by the Energy Institute (EI), the Joint Implementation Group (JIG) and the International Air Transport Association (IATA). The ADO contents of Tank 1 had to be transferred into Tank 4 for regrading works to commence. Once all contents were transferred, and after the allotted time needed for air circulation in Tank 1, the project team commenced with tank cleaning, modification of the tank inlet and outlet lines, welding and relining of 100% of the tank's interior. Upon completion, the works were inspected by an Internal Audit team and external NDT techs and issued a fitness-for-service certificate. The regrade ensures that the tank meets API653 & JIG12 standards and requirements.



The tank has been filled and is being placed into service. It has increased our JETA1 storage capacity from 100,000 US gallons to approximately 300,000 US gallons to help us meet the increasing demand.







CARL trials completed at NPP

Vital has completed trials of the new computerized maintenance management software, CARL. The main purpose of CARL is to manage the life cycles of all of Vital's physical assets.

CARL has two separate work platforms: the CARL Source and the CARL Touch. The Source is the main CARL data base where all data on assets are stored and managed, and where the administrative works on the assets are assessed. The Touch is the app installed on devices that is used by operators and technicians to receive and fulfill work orders sent from The Source. The Touch also transmits reports of completed tasks to The Source in real-time, effectively streamlining all needed maintenance works on assets and creating more efficiency.

The trial period of CARL was run at the Vital Nan Pohn mal Power Plant (NPP) where operators and technicians have been using CARL Touch to fulfill daily and weekly inspections. Initial training on the proper use of the system was completed in December 2018. CARL will soon be rolled out in our other locations in Quarter 1 of 2020.

Although CARL has significantly improved our maintenance processes and tasks, there have been challenges along the way. As a new system, our operators and technicians will need regular training as well as consistent practical use of the application. There have also been a few technical glitches, which Project Manager Neil Halstead has been working on resolving with the Sydney-based company. "One of the best things about the CARL app is the function that automates work orders, eliminating the whole paper-based reporting method and allowing our operators to transmit reports in real time," Halstead commented.

Vital continually strives for cost-effective and innovative solutions for our operational requirements. The CARL system is replacing paper-based reporting with automated work orders and reports, reducing time and resources previously used for maintenance inspections and work.

Q: What is the greatest Lesson Learned of the Year?


A: "The importance of living the Vital culture, "Safety in everything we do" and utilizing our company structure and support channels."

Coconut For Life Update

RAMP Retreat 2

Vital initiated the second retreat of 2019 for coconut supply chain stakeholders, which was held on December 4-5 at the Island Palms Hotel in Pohnpei.

The retreat was well represented by the FSM National Government, the State Governments, COM-FSM Cooperative Research Extension, iSTOP, FSM Social Security Administration, Micronesia Conservation Trust, The Pacific Community (SPC), Vital, and members of different Participant Guarantee System (PGS) groups in Pohnpei.

During the two-day retreat, participants presented on work relevant to the nation's coconut industry from

ed on work relevant to the nation's coconut industry from their respective departments and organizations. Discussions during the two days focused on ongoing projects, issues and challenges faced in 2019, and potential opportunities on the horizon.

MCT and members of the registered PGS groups in Pohnpei updated participants on the status of work being done in securing coconut supply from communities. They noted that while the timeline for registering PGS groups has faced some delay, there has been a significant increase in consistent coconut supply in Pohnpei because of the PGS groups. Work has already started in Yap and Chuuk to extend the opportunity to supply coconuts to farmers in these states.

4th Annual SATO Review


On August 12-13, representatives of the Government of Nauru and Supply Agreement Terminal Operations (SATO) met for the Nauru Petroleum Annual Review. The two day meeting was held on the Gold Coast, QLD Australia. Representing the Government of Nauru and SATO at the meeting were Messrs. John Petersen, Richard Hale and Shakil Kumar of Hale & Twomey Ltd, and representing Vital Energy, Inc. were Country Manager Maderson Ramon, Project Manager Abdul Saheem and Project Officer Mylani Alexander.

The first round of discussions covered Operations and Financials, and the agenda for Day 2 focused on the Masterplan for Capital Projects. Discussions progressed positively with these key outcomes:

- Approved NPT parameters
- Approved OPEX allowance increase
- Approved plans for Nauru's Transition to ULSD, targeted for early 2020
- Approved Capital Projects Masterplan
- Approved List of Projects

After the meeting, Country Manager Ramon commented, "It was a very successful meeting, with both parties signing several major agreements. Vital looks forward to discussing pricing and the possibility of extending our contract with the Government of Nauru by another five years at the next SATO Review which is set for August 2020."





Vital Marine Vessels Blessing and Official Launch in Chuuk




On December 14th, three marine vessels were blessed and launched in their home port of Weno, Chuuk. These marine vessels will be at the forefront of transport needs of the C4L initiative, transporting workers and resources

within the lagoon to Tonoas, where the Integrated Coconut Processing Facility (ICPF) will be located.

The SeaWatch is a passenger ferry that is currently being utilized to transport workers to and from Weno and Tonoas. The Mandy is a work boat that is utilized similarly. As part of our emergency response strategy, one of these vessels is always in port in Tonoas to provide emergency transport if required. The Vital Carrier was the main vessel of the ceremony, as this was its first time into port in Chuuk.

The Carrier was escorted into the harbor by speedboats from the local Chuuk Islands Fishing Club. Invited guests, the public and staff waited at the Transco Dock for the vessels to arrive and celebrations to begin.



The Vice Chairman of the FSMPC Board of Directors, Mr. Redley Killion, spoke on behalf of the Vital Group and welcomed all guests and public to the ceremony, touching on the significance of the marine vessels to the C4L initiative.

The Honorable Marion Henry, Secretary of FSM R & D, attended the event on behalf of the President and offered the Keynote Remarks for the ceremony. Secretary Henry spoke on the importance of the C4L initiative, not just to the State, but to the Nation and re-affirmed the National Government's support of the initiative.

As the traditional blessing of the vessels, the Vice Mayor of Weno struct a young coconut against the side of the Vital Carrier. To conclude the ceremony, Bishop Angkel boarded and blessed each vessel.

We com-

mend Joshua for the moves he's making as a young scholar from Pohnpei, and look forward to the amazing things he and other youth activists will do for the future of the FSM. We recently received this great message from Joshua and wanted to share his inspiring words:

"The GREEN Program has finally come to a conclusion in Iceland and I am back in the United States! I just wanted to take this time to formally thank The Vital Energy Group for their efforts in allowing me to attend the training and experience on Renewable Energy and Sustainability abroad. The contribution made by the Vital Group helped alleviate the financial costs associated with travel, tuition, and other miscellaneous expenses.

iSTOP and FSM Division of Quarantine representatives gave informative presentations on the current and potential natural threats to our coconut supply in the FSM, with discussion mainly around the coconut rhino beetle, which is already present in neighboring islands of Guam and Palau. Participants all agreed that collaboration and resource-sharing needs to be strengthened among all stakeholders if we are to combat any natural threats to our coconut resource.

The opportunity from this collaboration is to be developed from a common theme: a coconut industry specific national export strategy with emphasis on set targets, deliverables and stakeholder involvement in its implementation. The initial stages of establishing MOUs with all stakeholders has begun and is anticipated to be given final approvals within the beginning of the year.

A communique has been drafted outlining discussions and action items developed from this working retreat. This is just another step towards the realignment of participating organizations and stakeholders' mandates, missions and goals and a calendar of deliverables has been agreed upon to continue the collaboration and work in 2020.



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
